Thought for the week

Like many people, I have spent the last few weeks following the story of the Thai "cave-boys". It was an emotional roller-coaster as we learned of their disappearance, their discovery and their subsequent rescue. Last week we saw film footage of the boys and their coach entering a Buddhist monastery for a period of cleansing after their traumatic experiences. The nine days that they stay in the monastery will give them the opportunity to reflect on what has happened and allow them time to adjust before they return to normal life. In times of personal crises, perhaps we could all benefit from taking time to reflect and pray.



Over the last thirty years there has been a revival in pilgrimages. The three most popular Christian pilgrimages are those taken to Jerusalem, Rome and Santiago de Compostela. A pilgrimage is a journey or search of moral or spiritual significance. For many pilgrims, the visit to somewhere spiritual can become a turning point in their

life. A pilgrimage is often undertaken as it allows a person to come to terms with a personal crisis; it gives that person an opportunity to experience a period of separation from all that is familiar and enables them to share the hardships of a journey on the road. For many pilgrims, the journey is actually far more important than the arrival at the destination.

The majority of Christians will probably never travel along one of the main pilgrim routes and unlike the Thai boys, we may not spend time in a monastery but each and every one of us is on our own personal pilgrimage through life.

As we recently celebrated the Feast of St. James, perhaps we could reflect on our own journey and take a little time to withdraw from the familiar world and pray for the pilgrim-gifts of tolerance and humility. Our day-to-day journey should allow us, like St James himself, to live the Gospel and to share it with others we meet along the way.

The **SILLY SEASON** is now in full swing. In the United Kingdom and in some other places, the **silly season** is the period lasting for a few summer months typified by the

The term was coined in an 1861 *Saturday Review* article,¹ and was listed in the second edition of *Brewer's Dictionary of Phrase and Fable* (1894) and remains in use at the start of the 21st century. Other countries have comparable periods, for example the *Sommerloch* ("summer [news]hole") in German-speaking Europe.
